Entitled A Celebration of San Diego LGBT History, it is being presented by Lambda Archives of San Diego and the Harvey Milk Diversity Breakfast. The exhibit will feature approximately 1100 square feet of historical LGBT community treasures and will also feature an LGBT national and local timeline starting in the 1970s to the present. Other displays will include LGBT related performers, sports culture, military, marriage and faith, HIV/AIDS, civil rights, diversity, youth, the origins of Pride, politics, and community leadership. Taylor Bazley is the recipient of the John Bessemer Memorial Scholarship.
This scholarship is in mem ory of John Bessemer, who was a dedicated PFLAG dad. PFLAG San Diego is proud to have sponsored this scholarship since 2002. It is always a pleasure to have John's wife, PFLAG past president, Linda Bessemer, there every year to honor the recipient.

Taylor just graduated from San Diego High School of Science and Technology. He is planning on majoring in Economics at UCLA in the fall. A noteworthy mention is that Taylor attended his homecoming dance with a male date.



Even though that should be the "norm," it makes him a hero. Here is Taylor's essay:

"Receiving this scholarship in of its self will not be enough for me to attend college. However this scholarship is vital to me because it makes up a network of scholarships, grants, and loans which I will need to receive in order to pay for the school that I want to attend. I have already been accepted to UCLA as part of their class of 2014 (as an economics major) and if I can find enough financial aid, plan on attending. If I receive this scholarship it would become part of my network of financial aid that will allow

On June 22, Constance attended an LGBT Pride reception at the White House. She did meet President Obama for "about five seconds." She spent a day on Capitol Hill advocating on behalf of LGBT students. Also while she was in DC, she met with Senator Al Franken, lead sponsor of the Student Non-Discrimination Act. Then it was on to New York City.

First, she spoke at NYC Mayor Michael Bloomberg's Pride Week BBQ. Next, she shared Grand Marshall honors with Judy Shepard

and Lt. Dan Choi at New York City's Gay Pride Parade.

According to the ACLU, some school districts learned their lesson from Itawamba Agricultural High School/Constance and didn't challenge students from attending their proms

as same-sex couples.

The last four months have been both a difficult time and a thrilling time for Constance. She came out in eighth grade and never really considered herself an activist. In her mind, she

me to attend college, and will ultimately allow me to achieve the other goals I have in my life. I want to not just obtain a higher education in order to receive a good paying job, but I want to use my education to become a public servant and use my upbringing to provide me with a unique perspective that will help shape future public policy and make our world a better place.

As an LGBT student, I deserve this scholarship because I have had to work hard to overcome many obstacles to get to my present point, and I have still been able to take a proactive role in helping make my school and community a better place. My mother and I have suffered hardships, still I chose to take this adversity and make it a motivating factor not an affliction. Being raised by a single mother without the help of a father has enabled me to become independent. Being a minority within almost every school I have attended has given me tolerance. Being gay in a very homophobic society has given me patience. I want to become a public servant so I can make positive changes and help people through difficult times much like my mother and I have been helped. I already have created positive changes for my school by using my class presidency (2007-2010) and my student body council position (2007-2010) to implement new programs that allow disadvantaged and under represented students to have their voices heard and to be able to work off their admissions to senior events so that they can have the ability to enjoy the same high school experience as students with more money to be able to attend all

of the events. I want to give

people hope and resources

to make their lives successful and rewarding. I want to help others see adversity as a strength, not a weakness. With the right education and my natural motivation and strength I know my goals will be attained."

The recipient of the Rob Benzon Memorial Scholarship, in its 5th year, was Nicole Levin. The scholarship honors the memory of Rob Benzon and was presented by Board Members of the Rob Benzon Foundation, Steve Hawley and Dan Ferbal. Rob was an LGBT advocate and is fondly remembered.

Nicole is in her last year at SDSU and will graduate in December, 2010. Her essay is as follows:

"Growing up in Russia and the Ukraine as an American expatriate, I witnessed firsthand the effects of health and wealth disparities in developing nations. I realized that I wanted to dedicate my life to humanitarian work at age fourteen when I befriended an elderly homeless woman. Her determination to survive inspired and continues to motivate me towards a career in healthcare advocacy. With this in mind I am pursuing degrees in Nursing and International Security and Conflict Resolution (ISCOR) with a minor in Public Health. Nursing gives me practical skills that can be used worldwide.

ISCOR provides political knowledge and mediation skills to work in developing nations. Public Health plays an integral part by providing the fundamentals of community planning and building.

Together, these fields of study provide the best preparation for my career goals. I hope to gain several years of experience as an RN before obtaining a Masters in Public Health. Eventually I hope to work for Doctors Without Borders or the United Nations. In the meantime. I volunteer regularly with clinics and related organizations to build my skills and keep making a positive impact. The San Diego PFLAG Scholarship will allow me to continue my volunteer commitments and complete my coursework without the need to work to support myself.

As an LGBT student. I deserve this scholarship because of my dedication to global LGBT advocacy I helped organize a pride parade in Ljubljana, Slovenia, volunteered for the No on 8 campaign in California, advocated for the community with the Queer Group at Deakin University while studying in Melbourne, Australia, and participated in the first-ever LGBT outreach by the U.S. federal government. As a bisexual student I can better fight for the rights of the underprivileged because I am in a marginalized group myself. This not only enhances my goal of working with refugee populations but also gives me an international perspective that I can utilize as an activist for local LGBT rights."

ONE WORLD, ONE HEART, ONE PRIDE

It's that wonderful time of the year when the San Diego community comes together to celebrate the LGBT community with the 36th Annual Pride Celebration. This year the theme



is "One World, One Heart, One Pride." It was chosen because "it reminds us that none of us will be equal until we are all equal."

The first event on the Pride hit parade (and it's free!) takes place on Friday, July 16 from 6:00-7:30 **pm** — LGBT Pride Spirit of Stonewall Rally. This rally had disappeared for a few vears but it's baaaaack! It will take place at the festival location, Laurel and Sixth Avenue in Balboa Park. The rally will feature inspirational speakers and awards presentations for the recipients of the 2010 Spirit of Stonewall awards. which honor individuals and organizations that have made significant, positive impacts on San Diego's LGBT community.

The PRIDE Parade is Saturday, July 17 at 11:00 am. WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW BEFORE YOU LEAVE YOUR HOME FOR THE PARADE: A) This year, San Diego Pride will be requiring anyone marching/riding in the parade to sign a release form saying that it's okay for your picture to be used (i.e., TV or newspaper). We will distribute them at our meeting location. B) You will be in a mass buss/ people jam if you don't get to the old Balboa Naval Hospital early to catch the free shuttle buses to the parade site. It's located on



Park Blvd., across from President's Way. Plan on being at our contingent site by 10:15 so we can hurry up and wait together. As of right now, we do not know where PFLAG will be stationed, but an email prior to the parade will be sent. If you don't have email, you can ask at the information booth, located around University Avenue and Normal Street (about one block from the bus drop off point), **C)** wear comfortable shoes, D) put lots of sun block on, E) wear a hat, F) take water, G) bring a camera, **H)** make PFLAG signs and bring them, I) wear as much PFLAG clothing and paraphernalia as you own.

The parade (1.5 miles) begins at University Avenue and Normal Street, continues west on University, south on 6th and ends at Ivy Lane. If you've never participated in the parade, you will have quite a thrill, as the crowd goes crazy when we pass by. There are 150,000 spectators, many showing their appreciation to PFLAG.

To brag, this event is the best attended and largest single day event in San Diego. Another bragging right is that it's the **fifth** largest Gay Pride Parade in the U.S. Being that we are such hot shots, we always attract the best Grand Marshals, and this year is no exception. The LGBT community is honored that **Stuart Milk**, Harvey Milk's nephew and an activist

in his own right, will be the Grand Marshal. The Celebrity Grand Marshal is **Cloris Leachman**, who needs no introduction.




The Pride Festival starts at noon on Saturday, right after the parade, at Marston Point (6th and Juniper) and continues until 10 pm. On Sunday, it runs from 11:00 am-8:00 pm. Admission is \$15 for one day and \$25 for a two day pass.

Our PFLAG booth is on the main drag. There are 300 exhibitors, live entertainment, food booths, beer gardens, children's garden, art exhibits, and much more. **Eve** (no relation to Adam in this context) is the headliner for Saturday and **Devo**, the headliner for Sunday, with **Blake Lewis**
