A LIMITED VICTORY?

On **May 27**, the Senate Armed Services Committee voted 16-12 to repeal DADT (Don't Ask, Don't Tell, the policy that allows gays to serve in the military, but not openly). Then there was another victory on May 28 when the House of Representatives voted 229-186 for the passage of the National Defense Authorization Act which included the attachment to the bill to repeal DADT. So far so good until Senator John McCain and Republicans announced that they will filibuster the entire National Defense Authorization Act, (i.e., the defense budget) to stop the repeal of DADT if it comes to the floor of the full Senate.

According to the New York Times, McCain also solicited letters from the Joint Chiefs of Staff -- the chiefs of the Army, Navy, Air Force and Marines -that object to the repeal amendment. It doesn't get any better; the right-wing Family Research Council didn't take much prodding to get in on the act. They've cranked up their anti-gay rhetoric.

It was summed up well by Keith Olbermann on MSNBC, "John McCain is marshaling his own resistance to the Senate amendment, inexplicably siding with right-wing fringe groups, who are attempting to out-homophobe each other to prevent historic progress for gay Americans.

TWO IN A SEA OF MANY


It was good news for Steven Monjeza and Tiwonge Chimbalanga of Malawi. The president of Malawi has pardoned the two gay men who of being gay). President Bingu wa Mutharika announced his pardon after meeting with U.N. Secretary General Ban Ki-moon. No doubt world pressure helped these two men, but what about all the other thousands who are persecuted that we don't know about?

Authorities arrested Monjeza and Chimbalanga in December at their home after the couple professed their love in a traditional engagement ceremony. Police discovered the couple when local newspapers reported on their engagement ceremony.

Some in the conservative southern African nation of Malawi supported the prosecution, and government officials have said they were simply upholding the law. Human rights groups and advocates for gays and lesbians argued that the arrests violated Malawi's constitution, which outlaws discrimination. To those who thought they were upholding the law, the word "discrimination" must have a different meaning in Malawi. Of course, there is now concern for the men's safety.

HELP FOR UGANDA

Bishop Christopher Ssenyonjo is a man of



courage. He is touring the country to make people aware of the anti-gay bill pending in Uganda that will make gays subject to the death penalty and imprison people who don't turn in people they know are gay.

The annual scholarship that has been part of the program the longest and in its 10th year is the Mary Wagner Memorial Scholarship. This was established for elementary school teacher Mary Wagner by her partner, Sharon Murphy, and friends Marilyn and Art Carpenter. The recipi-

ent is Rodolfo John
Alaniz, a graduate
student at the University of California,
San Diego (UCSD)
with the objective of
obtaining his PhD in
the History of Science. Here is John's
essay:

"So, you think homosexuality is not a choice? Perhaps you believe that human sexuality is hard-wired into our biology, or even predetermined by our genetic code. Many gay activists would agree with you. However, even if you don't believe that we are born with a predetermined sexual orientation; "gay gene rhetoric" has been an important,

teenth century naturalists connected homosexuality to evolutionary theory. Our society has relied upon biology to help us understand homosexuality and society for over two centuries.



Biology seems to give us answers.

I have the opportunity to work with a UCSD professor, Dr. Kelly Gates, to create a "Genetics and Society" collegelevel course curriculum over the summer. Her dissertation on identity and the gay gene has been very influential in my work. I would like use this scholarship to incorporate sustainable discussions of sexuality and race into the university setting. Genetics,

social issues. One of the greatest difficulties in creating change is bringing a message to broad, diverse audiences. A well-designed university course on science and society will reach that audience."



We were most pleased to award the Mac McWhorter Memorial Scholarship to Chris Vogt. This is the second year Louise McWhorter and family have presented this scholarship. It is in honor/memory of Louise's husband, Mac, who was a PFLAG dad and a fierce supporter of LGBT rights. Louise presented a copy of Mac's book, The First Hellcat Ace, to Chris. Mac was a

U.S. Navy Ace in WWII.

Chris will complete his Master's of Social Work degree from San Diego State University next May.

"I am member of PFLAG San Diego and have been attending the group over the last couple of years. The group has inspired me to encourage my mother to start her own group in Plain, Wisconsin. PFLAG is unique because it provides education, support, and an opportunity for growth for its members. But one critical observation that I have is that the group is not very multicultural. Stigma around homosexuality and transgenderism continues to exist in both dominant and minority cultures, but it manifests in different ways. I'm interested in learning how homophobia presents itself in the African American community specifically, and to explore how LGBT advocacy groups like PFLAG could be working with this community to bring about change. As a PFLAG member and scholarship candidate I would like to lead or assist in actively reaching out to the African American community.

I began research on the subject of homophobia in the black community as part of an assignment in my social work community organizing class. After meeting with several LGBT black church leaders, I was happy to hear about the strong movement that was underway, but surprised that they had not heard of PFLAG. which I thought was common knowledge. Common to whom? This was the guestion I had to ask myself, and to see that I was operating from the somewhat narrow perspective of my own racial and class background. My not having heard of "their" groups and their not having heard of "my" group, PFLAG, made me think that we were missing an opportunity to work together and achieve more. In light of this, I would like to work on building a relationship between PFLAG and the African American community.

Strategies to achieve this are to link black community leaders to PFLAG board members, to invite them to speak at PFLAG meetings, and to recruit PFLAG members from the black community. Also, I would ask and encourage PFLAG members to attend African American LGBT advocacy groups and organizations. Through this exchange of ideas and mutual support, I envision not only a stronger advocacy movement for the LGBT community, but also a lessening of the racial divide. As an LGBT student, I deserve this scholarship because I will apply my knowledge of community organizing to develop a collaborative relationship between PFLAG and the African American LGBT community and its supporters."

MORE NOTCHES IN THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH'S BELT

Much to the chagrin of the Archbishop of Canterbury, Rowan Williams, the Episcopal Church consecrated its first openly lesbian bishop in the face of objections from some conservative Anglicans.

The Rev. Mary Glasspool, 56, is a new bishop in Los Angeles and is surrounded by controversy. Conservative factions in the Anglican Communion, a 77 millionmember denomination worldwide that includes the Episcopal Church, have opposed the ordination of gay bishops. Glasspool is the first openly gay bishop in the Episcopal Church since Gene Robinson took office in New Hampshire in 2004. Episcopalians instituted a temporary ban on gay bishops after Robinson's ordination but revoked that ban last summer.

Glasspool is the daughter of a priest and says her sexual orientation is "not an issue."

Bishop Jon Bruno of Los Angeles called Glasspool, an ordained priest for 28 years, a "highly qualified and experienced" cleric. "She's not afraid of conflict and is a reconciler," Bruno said. He added that Glasspool and her partner of 19 years, Becki Sander, are an example of living service and ministry.

Not only was this film an official selection at the 2010 Sundance

Film Festival, the five screenings they had were sold out before any other Sundance documentary and all but a handful of feature films. Director Reed Cowan and his fellow filmmakers experienced first-hand what it was like to grow up gay in Utah in the Mormon faith. They turned their attention to the historic campaign by the Mormon Church to pass Proposition 8 in California, believing that it was the cornerstone of an ideology that has worked for decades "to damage gay people and their causes." The film is their emotional outcry to what they found. As Mr. Cowan told The Herald Journal "The film is important and premiering in Utah makes it even more important. ... Bringing an examination of the wrongdoing to the scene of the crimes, so to speak, is historic." To see the movie trailer, go to www.mormonproposition.com.

DO THE RIGHT THING

In April, President Obama mandated that nearly all hospitals extend visitation rights to the partners of gay men and lesbians and respect patients' choices about who may make critical health-care decisions for them, perhaps the most significant step so far in his efforts to expand the rights of gay Americans. The new rule will affect any hospital that receives Medicare or Medicaid funding, a move that covers the vast majority of the nation's healthcare institutions. Thank you, Mr. President.
