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NEXT ON THE HIT PARADE



Riley Gibson is the recipient of the **2016 Brian Wilson Memorial Scholarship**. The scholarship is funded by the Rob Benzon Foundation. After a rather up and down life, Riley is now at Palomar College, hoping to transfer to SDSU to pursue LGBT Studies. He feels the LGBT community is his chosen

family who has empowered him to take a stand and to use his voice and experience as a powerful educational tool. Being transgender, he feels compelled to educate students in high school about trans issues. Riley even appeared before a local school board in support of trans students there.

"2015 was a pretty huge year for me, and I am a completely different person as a result. This was the year I shifted from just sticking my toes into the water to taking a running jump into the ocean that is LGBT activism. I grew up pretty much having everything provided for me despite being forced so far into the closet that I had to deal with really nasty depression for about 10 years of my 22 year lifespan. Granted, I still had a nice cozy upper middle class home, and went to nationally recognized blue ribbon schools. Things got a rocky when the economy crashed and my parents had to deal with foreclosing twice and they really started to lock down and become extremely conservative, but it's not like my life was in any real danger. Really, it wasn't until they kicked me out that my life got turned on its head. After losing everything in my life that I thought I could never live without and going through the painful mourning process, living in extreme poverty, and walking among those who grew up with absolutely nothing has completely changed my world view. I have seen the best of San Diego and I have seen the absolute worst. Despite living in San Diego all my life, there were so many places that I had never seen before. I was homeless and I had nothing,

but things were different -- everything had a new flavor to it. I had started working at San Diego Pride in their Marketing & Communications department as a full time volunteer, and they gave me the gift of a bus pass. With this bus pass, I now had the freedom to do what I wanted, when I wanted. And that's exactly what I did. Next thing I knew, I was doing my best to help organizing and attend every event surrounding Pride and transgender issues in Hillcrest possible. I had nothing better to do and no one wanted to hire me, so why not? It felt like I was actually doing something with my life, unlike working at a dead-end retail job. For the first time in my life I felt happy and fulfilled, even in the absence of everything I once had. Occasionally reality would settle in and my stomach would sink upon realizing that I didn't know where I'd be sleeping the next week, but my overall positive demeanor and drive to continue helping kept me going in spite of that. I found my home in grassroots and community organizing. Now that I'm back in college and trying to balance that with rent, I'm Vice President of the GSA and have led numerous events. My biggest accomplishment last semester was the Transgender Day of Remembrance event we hosted, where I decided to go with a new approach. TDOR traditionally is an event where the community gathers to remember and mourn those we lost, which is important, but I stopped and thought 'How do we make it so that someday we don't have to gather for TDOR?' The answer seemed simple enough: educate the uneducated. Most people don't know or care about trans issues, but maybe they'd care more if they understood the severity of the issue on a local and national level and had some faces to put the issue to. There were multiple portions to the day-long event, and I brought in speakers from all over the local county. The event was a success and the school wants us to keep it as an annual event."

STAND TOGETHER; STAND STRONG

The LGBTQ community (one of many) was thrown for a loop, to say the least, with the results of the presidential election. Many in the community feel our future victories will require us to dig deeper and work harder to protect our progress, and to limit the damage that Donald Trump has promised. We cannot slow down; we need to double down. The Human Rights Campaign, among other organizations who strive for LGBTQ equality, will work undeterred and focused to insure every LGBTQ person feels safe, equal, and valued. We cannot be bullied by the next administration. From what he said, Trump will appoint an ultra-conservative Justice (word used loosely) to reverse the U.S. Supreme Court's ruling on marriage equality; he supports banning transgender people from using the bathroom that aligns with their gender identity; he will legitimize gay "conversion therapy," and, with the push from Mike Pence, will encourages businesses to deny services to LGBT Americans. As governor of Indiana, Pence, the homophobe, is more of a terrifying threat to LGBT people than Trump. He has built a career on pushing through anti-LGBT legislation.

Therefore, we must all stand together and stand strong.
