The scholarship program could not have been the success that it has been without lan Morton, past Director of Operations at the San Diego Human Dignity Foundation. He tirelessly worked on get-



THE GENDERBREAD PERSON

The following are excerpts from an article written by Sharon Groh-Wargo, PFLAG Cleveland President (used with permission).

Wait a minute! Is that right? Shouldn't that sentence be "He or she is coming to dinner?" Sorry grammar nerds. Singular they, the gender-neutral pronoun, was named the 2016 Word of the Year by the American Dialect Society. A

spokesperson for the society said "We're ultimately looking for words that say something about the way we're living now, about the way we use words to express our shared experiences." The Washington Post, along with other notable publications, suggest that "the singular they is the only sensible solution to English's lack of a gender-neutral third-person singular personal pronoun." in Electrical Engineering. While in high school, she had served as president and vice president of her school's GSA, in addition to being president of the Debate Team and National Honor Society.

One of Celestial's biggest achievements was her internship after her junior year at SPAWAR Systems Center Pacific. With her knowledge and curiosity in the STEM areas, she

This news got me thinking about the quickly evolving language of our LGBT community. The Genderbread Person is a great resource (www.ltsPronouncedMetrosexual.com). It not only clearly defines *Gender Identity* (how you, in your head, define your gender), *Gender Expression* (the ways you present gender through your action, dress, and demeanor), *Biological Sex* (the physical sex characteristics you are born with and develop), and *Sexual Orientation* (who you are physically, spiritually, and romantically attracted to), but also gives us language across the spectrum of each of these characteristics.

As PFLAG members and allies, we are careful and intentional with the terms we use to tell our stories. This helps our friends and allies in their journeys of understanding and acceptance.

We have had several members of the community speak to us about current terms that apply to our LGBTQ+ community. The Genderbread Person and this quick guide will act as a good reference. percentage of LGBTQ+ identifying youth in crisis. Inspired to take action, we decided to use our club resources to gather clothes for two LGBTQ+ friendly homeless shelters in San Diego County. We orchestrated to have a 'collection center' at lunch every day for an entire week, which took about a month in advance of solid preparation. We dubbed our drive the 'NonBinary Boutique' to express how our efforts were to help increase the number of resources available to gender nonconforming youth.

In the end, stacks of bags and boxes filled to the brim with donations were collected and delivered to the facilities.

Another benefit from the clothing drive was that it created

interest in our club around campus. More students were learning about our GSA chapter, and we had an influx of members as a result. It was heartening to see the campus environment become more educated and accepting towards the LGBT community, as well as having the

club establish a new and purposeful tradition.

With the organizational skills I utilized in planning the event logistics, and the managerial skills I developed through guiding club volunteers, I believe I have a solid foundation in planning service projects for the future. I have also come to appreciate all the serious work that occurs behind the scenes, which has made me a more mindful volunteer for other service events. In the future, I hope to continue participating in service projects that increase access to valuable resources for disadvantaged individuals, especially the homeless population, who deserve more compassion and respect than they are often given in the status quo."

Gender binary (noun): the idea that there are only two genders and that every person is one of those two

Gender non-conforming (adj): (1) a gender expression descriptor that indicates a non-traditional gender presentation (masculine woman or feminine man), and (2) a gender identity label that indicates a person who identifies outside of the gender binary

Gender Queer (adj): (1) a gender identity label often used by people who do not identify with the binary of man/woman, and (2) an umbrella term for many gender non-conforming or non-binary identities (e.g., agender, bigender, genderfluid)

Pansexual (adj): a person who experiences sexual, romantic, physical, and/or spiritual attraction for members of all gender identities/expressions
