LOVE, SIMON

It is the hope of director Greg Berlanti that the movie, "Love, Simon" brings conversations between parents and their children.

"Love, Simon" is the first of its kind, with two gay teens connecting via email, confronting their queerness together, and finding their happy, out-and-proud endings. According to the producer, one of the best parts of producing this film is that some teen in Small Town, America, where oftentimes queer movies don't get a theatrical release, one can see him or herself reflected on the big screen. Instead of the usual distribution of some gay-themed films (600-900), "Love, Simon" opened to a whopping 2,400-plus theaters.

TEEN-VERSIONARY

Diversionary Theatre is proud to present Teen-Versionary, their first teen acting company exploring the LGBT experience. Teen-Versionary runs Monday-Friday, **July 9-19**, 10:00 am-3:00 pm. Concluding on Friday, **July 20**, the group will present the play, *queerSpawn*, written by Mallory Avidon, at 3:00 pm and 7:00 pm.

The group is comprised of LGBT teens and their allies, creating a safe space to creatively explore the story and characters. Youth from 13 to recent high school graduates are welcome to apply for a position in Teen-Versionary.

queerSpawn tells the story of The Kid, a fourteen-year-old starting high school in a small town. Everyone knows he has two moms, and that's just the beginning of his trouble. While dodging bullies, The Kid conjures imaginary allies, including sex/relationship advice columnist Dan Savage and Dr. McSteamy from TV's *Grey's Anatomy*. This provocative, hilarious and poignant new play takes an unflinching look at what it means to be a teen today, and the persisting stigma around the LGBT identity.

THE MILITARY'S BACK AND FORTH

Recently, the top uniformed official in the U.S. Army, Army Chief of Staff General Mark Milley, undermined recommendations from Defense Secretary James Mattis against transgender military service — which led to President Trump's ban on transgender people in the armed forces — by asserting their presence has had no negative impact on unit cohesion.

Milley, along with Army Secretary Mark Esper, made remarks during congressional testimony on whether a transgender service person renders the military "unprepared." Senator Kirsten Gillibrand (D-NY), has introduced legislation against Trump's transgender military ban.

Gillibrand, who cited concerns about unit cohesion in the aftermath of the anti-trans recommendations, asked the Army officials if transgender service — first allowed in the Obama years under former Defense Secretary Ashton Carter before Trump tried to ban it — had resulted in any problems. Both officials replied it had not.

"We have a finite number," Milley said. "We know who they are, and it is monitored very closely because we're concerned about that and want to make sure that they are in fact treated with dignity and respect and no have precisely zero reports of issues of cohesion, discipline, moral and all sorts of things."

The evaluation that transgender service hasn't negatively affected unit cohesion stands in contrast to the report produced by Mattis to justify Trump's transgender ban, which was made public last month by the White House. In part, the report stated that, "Undermining the clear sex-differentiated lines with respect to physical fitness; berthing, bathroom and shower facilities; and uniform and grooming standards, which have all served the branches well to date, risks unnecessarily adding to the challenges faced by leaders at all levels, potentially fraying unit cohesion, and threatening good order and discipline."

Aaron Belkin, director of the San Francisco-based Palm Center, said in a statement that Milley's testimony speaks volumes about transgender service and undermines Mattis' conclusions.

"It is telling for the Army chief of staff to acknowledge there have been 'zero' problems with cohesion, discipline or morale just weeks after a DOD report, ostensibly based on months of research, insisted that transgender troops pose a risk to cohesion, discipline and morale," Belkin said.

Gillibrand also added that the ban could be harmful. "Transgender service members have now seen the department's recommendation and are on notice that if the policy is implemented, they will get kicked out for seeking care or treatment for their gender dysphoria," Gillibrand said. "I'm worried that this uncertainty will have a negative

impact on these individuals, but also on their units and that fear of these recommendations will stop these soldiers from seeking care."

In the wake of a letter from Democrats seeking information on the process that led Mattis to come to his recommendations against transgender service, Gillibrand asked the officials about the degree to which they had input on this recommendation, citing objections to the recommendations from the American Medical Association about its conclusions.

When Gillibrand asked who represented the Army on the panel of "experts" Mattis convened, Milley said it was Vice Chief of the Army General James McConville. When Gillibrand asked if any medical experts were included on the panel, Milley said he was unsure, but knew McConville "consulted with lots of internal folks, medical professionals, absolutely yes." Gillibrand asked Milley to submit to the Senate Armed Services Committee the names of the experts who were consulted, and Milley agreed to do at a later time. Funny how experts were "consulted," but not on the panel. They were fraidy cats to have someone on the panel with expertise.

Aaron Belkin added, "... research as well as lessons from two years of inclusive policy and 18 foreign militaries that allow transgender service is that treating everybody according to the same standards is what's best for readiness. The problem with the Trump ban is that it is based on scientific distortions, cherry-picked data and double standards that apply only to transgender troops, and no one else."



DAY OF SILENCE

On **Friday, April 27**, GLSEN (formerly Gay, Lesbian and Straight Education Network) will be supporting the 28th year of Day of Silence. This student-led national event organized in thousands of schools, brings awareness to the silencing effect of anti-LGBTQ name-calling, bullying, and harassment in schools. Students from middle school to college take a vow of silence in an effort to encourage schools and classmates to address the problem of anti-LGBTQ behavior. Since the current U.S. administration sees fit to normalize LGBTQ discrimination, it is more important than ever to call attention to the bullying.

That is the theme for Gender Odyssey taking place from June 21-24 in Pasadena (Sheraton Pasadena Hotel). This one-of-a-kind annual gathering attracts people from all over the world for an uplifting weekend of connection, support, and community. 
