BE PART OF TRANS PRIDE



FUNNY IF IT WEREN'T SO SAD

Despite the fact that hate crimes have doubled since Russia implemented its "gay propaganda" law in 2013, LGBT people attending the World Cup, which kicks off there June 14 and runs through mid-July, will be met with a "warm" welcome, even allowing attendees to put their LGBT pride on display, according to the country's World Cup organizing committee, the Associated Press reports.

"All visitors to Russia in 2018 — regardless of race, gender, religion, ability or sexual orientation — can expect a warm welcome," the committee said in a statement. "Persons will not be fined for expressing their feelings. The display of rainbow flags in the stands or at public celebrations will be allowed."

The head of Russia's LGBT Sports Federation, Alexander Agapov, backed up the committee's assertion that LGBT attendees can expect to feel safe in a country where the government has arrested its citizens under the "gay propaganda" law for disseminating material supportive of LGBT rights or even discussing such identities in any venue where minors could be exposed to it.

Time will tell. Hopefully, Russian citizens won't take advantage of this temporary freedom, as it will cost them dearly when the World Cup is over.

A perfect way to start is with our longest running scholarship (19 years!), the Mary Wagner Memorial Scholarship. Friends of Mary Wagner, Art and Marilyn Carpenter and Sharon Murphy, have made this annual scholarship possible. The recipient is Kalo Grimsby. Presenter Olivia Dorman, past Scholarship Chairperson, was aptly chosen to give Kalo her award. She recently graduated from San Dieguito Academy and is headed to UC San Diego where she will major in cognitive and behavioral

neuroscience. Her goal is to eventually get her Master's degree in neuropsychology. Kalo was a participant in the AVID Club (Advancement Via Individual Determination; a college readiness program) her entire high school career. In her senior year, she was in the AVID Senior Seminar. Kalo has overcome many personal obstacles and is well deserving of this award.

Kalo's essay:

"When I first heard about Trailblazers I wanted to join immediately. Trailblazers is a program where high school students help teach struggling elementary school kids how to read. I wanted to contribute to this effort because reading is very important to me and has helped me get through my life teaching me many valuable life lessons. Because of this, I thought the best thing I could do for the community is teach these children the passion of reading. The first day I started as an official Trailblazer I nervously walked into the designated elementary school room. I sat down with my first student and introduced myself, and picked out a book. The student, oblivious to my awkwardness, began to read. As I pointed out errors, and helped the student understand what he was reading, I began to relax. As we finished the book, I was proud of him, and grew excited as he showed a growing passion for reading. I have stayed in the Trailblazers program all through high school, and now as a senior, I am a coordinator for the Trailblazer program. I now record who is coming to the elementary school on which days and determine where people can get rides, and help the other Trailblazers determine which kids to read with, and how to work with the children if they are unable to focus. The best part of being a Trailblazers coordinator is being able to work with the children in developing new reading skills. In the beginning of the year, we did orientation for the incoming Trailblazers, and I spoke to the new faces, most of which looked just as nervous as I felt when I started and I began to teach them on how to read with the students. A week after that, I was able to sit down and help more students. As we were reading I saw the curious interest in their eyes, and I could not wait to teach more children the joys of reading. Trailblazers has led me to a passion of helping people. I want to change the world for the better by helping the people within the community, and I can do this by doing my part to help the people who need it, such as sick people. A way to make these differences in the community is to become a neurologist or neuropsychologist. I am interested in neuropsychology, and in addition to studying what I enjoy I can help people. I want to work both in the research setting, and the medical setting with patients around me. By learning about how the brain works and how changes in the brain can affect a person's psychological state, I will be able to create new techniques to further medical research into these growing fields. I would like to do research about neurology and about new

Also doing research into the brain itself and how the brain functions and how neurons are able to be manipulated within research and gaining access to the limits of the brain. Lastly, I can change the community for the better by becoming a role model for other LGBTQ+youth, and in turn, my success will highlight the positive contributions of the LGBTQ+ community."

As PFLAG San Diego County President, Terrie is grateful for the opportunity to meet other LGBTQ supporting organization members, advocate for youth and the LGBTQ community, educate herself and others, and support families that have questions and concerns. She's had the pleasure of sharing the PFLAG message in Portugal and with visitors from around the globe who hope to use PFLAG

as a model to create a network of informed, supportive families worldwide. She has learned so much from the strong voices in the LGBTQ and ally communities in San Diego and is forever grateful for their generosity. She thanks her parents for teaching her that all human beings deserve respect and kindness and for guiding her to PFLAG.

PERSIST WITH PRIDE

Here are events, in order of appearance, for the 44th Pride Weekend, themed "Persist with Pride." See separate article on the Trans Pride Celebration.

July 13 (Friday): Spirit of Stonewall Rally and Awards - they will be presented to individuals or groups who contribute significantly to the LGBT community through their leadership, activism, and fundraising effort (see article, "Our Friend of Pride"). The location for the rally is the Hillcrest Pride Flag, 1500 University Ave, Hillcrest, starting at 6:00 pm. The



keynote speaker is Virginia Delegate **Danica Roem**, the first transgender state legislator. The event is free.

As a refresher on the history of Stonewall (Inn) riots, there was a series of violent confrontations that began in the early hours of June 28, 1969, between police, who were brutal in the treatment of the gay community, and gay rights activists outside the Stonewall Inn, a gay bar in the Greenwich Village. The "event" lasted three days and is heralded as the beginning of the mainstream LGBT rights movement.

July 14 (Saturday): At 9:30 am, Front Runners and Walkers will have their Pride 5K Run/Walk beginning at University Avenue at Centre Street. To register, go to: www.frwsd.org.

July 14 (Saturday): The Pride Parade begins at 11:00 am. It starts at University Avenue and Normal Street in Hillcrest. The route is 1.1 miles. If you have never marched in San Diego's parade, you are in for a real treat. Besides all the excitement of the event, the crowd goes crazy when PFLAG passes by. There are upwards of 100,000 spectators. And speaking of walking 1.1 miles, if you cannot walk that distance and want to ride in the parade, please contact Mike Minnick immediately. There is only one car this year. Mike can be reached at 619-804-5512 or MMinnick@pflag.com. Free event.

After the parade (until 10:00 pm) is the Pride Festival (also Sunday, **July 15** from 11:00 am-9:00 pm), which includes multiple stages of entertainment, more than 80 musicians, bands, comedy and dance performers, 300 participating vendor booths, an art exhibit, cultural presentations, and great food! There is also a Farmers Market, Beer Garden, and Youth Zone. Most important is our PFLAG booth, located on the main drag. The festival is located at Marston Point at 6th and Laurel in Balboa Park. Tickets are \$20 for one day and \$25 for the weekend (+\$1.75 service charge if purchased online). To purchase tickets: www.sdpride.org. Please note, there are no discounts for seniors or military.

At the Festival, tickets are \$30.00 which is a weekend pass.

Here comes the lecture part. For the Pride Parade on Saturday, read this **BEFORE YOU LEAVE HOME!** These are suggestions that have stood the test of time: 1) get to the shuttle buses early; there are free shuttle buses from the old Balboa Naval Hospital located on Park Blvd. across from President's Way. If you are a procrastinator, now isn't the time as the buses back up and you'll be waiting in line so long that you'll miss part of the parade, 2) wear comfortable shoes, 3) put on lots of sun block, 4) wear a hat, 5) bring a camera/cell phone, 6) make PFLAG signs and bring them, 7) wear as much PFLAG/rainbow clothing and paraphernalia as you own.

Here are a few suggestions for signs:

Closets are for Clothes, Focus on Your Own Family, Gay Rights ARE Civil Rights, Homophobia - Now That's a Choice, I'm for the Separation of Church and Hate, Homophobia - That's SO last millennium, I'm the Pink Sheep of the Family, Love Knows No Gender, Protect Marriage. Let's Expand It, What Part of Love Don't You Understand?, We the People - that means all of us.

OLIVIA OTTONE HONORED



It is always nice to have updates on past scholarship recipients. The STEM scholarship was awarded to Olivia in 2012. After graduating high school, she attended Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology, which was not known for their LGBTQ diversity. Olivia set out to change that. She received her Bachelor of Science degree in Chemical Engineering, and in May, 2018, received her Master's degree in Engineering Management.

Much to Olivia's surprise, she received of the 2018 Tom Miller Fabric of Rose-Hulman Award. She is the first recipient of this prestigious award. Tom Miller, Dean of Student Affairs, has been credited with developing the Rose-Hulman experience, a much-loved program by the student body.

Olivia did not know she was receiving the award. Luckily, her partner, Jordan, recorded the presentation by Dr. Miller. Here is the transcript:

A TRIBUNE TO BARBARA BUSH

Barbara Bush, who died April 16, left behind a legacy as both a former First and Second Lady for encouraging good citizenship and patriotism. But she is unique also for using her position to embrace gay rights and HIV/AIDS at a time when they were unpopular issues, especially among conservatives. It was said that she sent the religious right into orbit!

The standout moment for Bush on gay rights was in 1990 when she was First Lady. Mrs. Bush responded to a letter from then-PFLAG president Paulette Goodman, who led the group for parents and friends of gay people and sought support for the then-fledgling organization. Ms Goodman was initially prompted to write the letter when she saw Mrs. Bush on TV, visiting a home with babies and children affected by HIV and AIDS. At a time when HIV infection was a death sentence, her hugging those with HIV/AIDS helped to dispel stigma and fears the disease could be transferred simply through touch.

In the response to Paulette the First Lady said, "I firmly believe we cannot tolerate discrimination against any

individuals or groups in our country. Such treatment always brings with it pain and perpetuates intolerance." Referring to Ms Goodman's letter, she concluded by saying, "Your words speak eloquently of your love for your child and your compassion for all gay Americans and their families."

The letter, which may have been the first gay-positive comments to come from the White House, was reported by the Associated Press and reportedly ignited a firestorm among social conservatives, who were pushing for the U.S. government to condemn gay people at a time when the HIV/AIDS epidemic was at its height. Goodman said Bush's letter to PFLAG "put us on the national scene" and in the aftermath "our letters were picked up by press, and PFLAG National began getting calls, putting PFLAG on the map."

As a P.S. to this article, in 2013, Barbara and former President George H.W. Bush attended a same-sex wedding of friends near their vacation home in Kennebunkport, Maine. President Bush signed the marriage certificate as a witness. It's nice to see people evolving, even in their 80s!

KEEP THE BALL ROLLING

Following in the steps of Oregon, California, and Washington, Maine has become the fourth state in the U.S. to offer gender-neutral licenses. In June, 2017, Ian-Meredythe Dehne Lindsey requested a driver's license with a non-binary gender marker. When denied because of "current computer system limitations," he filed an official complaint

with the Maine Human Rights Commission. Thanks to the formal complaint, starting in July, 2019, the Maine Bureau of Motor Vehicles license application will have an "X" as a gender marker option. In the meantime, they are currently issuing stickers for licenses stating, "Gender has been changed to X-Non-binary."
