SPOTLIGHT ON EMMA GONZÁLEZ



In the aftermath of the horrific Valentine's Day shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in South Florida, a new movement has emerged that constitutes the strongest voice for changing laws about automatic assault weapons since the Columbine massacre of 1999.

Emma González, the face of this movement, took a leadership role with a passionate speech in front of the Broward County Courthouse, where she criticized President Trump and other politicians for accepting donations from the National Rifle Association. She is a strong voice against gun violence, and calls B.S. like she sees it.

Many people do not know Emma is bi-sexual. She mentioned it as the lead paragraph of her essay published in *Harper's Bazaar* ("I'm 18 years old, Cuban, and bisexual," she said) and in an interview in the *Washington Post*, but, in general, it is mentioned only by a scattering of LGBT publications. However, she feels her bi-identity is one of the reasons she is such a compelling speaker. She has said that being open about her sexuality has helped propel her activism. She claims if she wasn't so open about who she was, she never would've been able to speak out in such a forceful way.

Emma was active in her GSA for three years and was president this last year. She said her participation in her school's GSA and recent self-outing resounds with her queerness. When people wonder about her buzz cut, she simply explains, "Hair is just another sweater I'm forced to wear." She explained it was a buzz cut, rather than totally shaving her head because she did feel forced to wear some hair.

Not to be punny, but hats off to Emma.

Gemma excelled at The School of Science, Connections & Technology through Kearny High School, where she was valedictorian. She will be attending UCLA in the fall.

Besides JROTC, some of Gemma's activities/achievements while in high school include being co-president of the GSA and president of Circle of Friends. This club pairs student volunteers with students with special needs. Gemma was instrumental in having the first gender-neutral bathroom, the removal of gender specific robe color for Kearny's graduation, and the planning and implementation of a school garden.

Gemma's essay:

"I have never belonged anywhere more than within my community. There exists an unwavering passion and commitment to others, that is nothing less than remarkable. This has been a constant inspiration to me to give back to my community in any way I can.

I have worked to make a change in my community in high school through my involvement in several groups, starting with the Gender and Sexuality Alliance. I know this world is not fair, but I have realized it is part of my duty as a human being to make it as fair as possible. To do this I have advocated for LGBTQIA+ rights on campus as the Gender and Sexuality Alliance Vice President. Within the last year, I have worked to open the first gender neutral bathroom on campus to provide a safe space for students and faculty who identify anywhere on the gender spectrum. The creation of this space has helped to set aside an area where people can feel comfortable with the way they identify on campus as well as open the conversation about gender in classrooms. This event has motivated peers and teachers to want to understand this part of the community and what they are going through as well as to learn how to better respect them. The effects that this action had on my community has made it one of the many rewarding

experiences I have been fortunate enough to be a part of.

Groups, like Circle of Friends and the Student Equity Ambassadors, provided me with more opportunities to make a difference on my campus. I have worked to serve the disabled community by creating a safe environment for students by facilitating friendships between general education students and disabled students as the President of Circle of Friends. Through this club, I have worked to involve special needs students in weekly activities with general education students to build their social skills. In doing so, we promote inclusion and awareness on our campus. Another group I have been a part of is the Student Equity Ambassadors, where I advocate for student rights within thirty other high schools in my district. I have spoken at Board of Education meetings, district wide coalitions, and panels at conferences on the effects of bullying, the importance of student-teacher relations, and building respect to address issues related to bullying and mental health. Through working with students from each group, I have learned that the circumstances that students face do not define them but instead, make them stronger. This has not only helped me to become more determined to make a difference in the lives of those who cannot for themselves. but it reminds me of the power that an individual holds to change the lives of the people around them.

In the future I want to continue to have a positive impact on the lives of those around me through demonstrating the same selflessness, drive, and compassion that I have seen my own community demonstrate. I will accomplish this through participation in the Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC) Program in University. Through this program I will be able to build meaningful connections with peers who are just as passionate as I am about community. The ROTC Program will provide me with the skills and resources to make a larger impact in the lives of others. Alongside my experience in ROTC, I hope to use my education to have an impact on the lives of those around me. Working towards a mathematics degree in university will prepare me for a career in the U.S. Military. From my experiences in leadership positions within school and my community I have learned that it is truly an honor to be of service to others. It is important for me to fight for others to have the same opportunities I have had. I am grateful to live the life that I have in America with these liberties. Joining the military is my way of showing gratitude. There, I want to work with others to make a change in our world.

These milestones will bring me closer to becoming someone that represents the traits that I admire in my community. I hope to be a person that inspires others to work hard and to become the best version of themselves; in the same way that my community has for me my entire life."


