KNOW YOUR DRAG QUEENS

As a part of the groundbreaking exhibition, LGBTQ+ San Diego: Stories of Struggles + Triumphs, the San Diego History Center will shine the spotlight on the performance art of drag. This new exhibit is entitled, "Legendary Drag Queens of San Diego!" The Opening Reception is **June 21** from 6:00-9:00 pm. San Diego History Center Members are free and non-members are \$10. It will remain there **through September 8**. This is part of the commemoration of the 50th anniversary of the Stonewall rebellion—a pivotal moment in LGBTQ+ history.

Curated by noted LGBTQ+ historian and author Dr. Lillian Faderman, and in collaboration with the Imperial Court de San Diego, the exhibit will feature elaborate, glittering costumes and personal stories of leading drag queens who have made their name not only locally but nationally. San Diego's First Lady Katherine Faulconer, wife of San Diego's mayor, will be the Honorary Chair of the exhibition.

This one-of-a-kind annual gathering attracts people from all over the world for an uplifting weekend of connection, support, and community.

Thanks in part to Executive Director, Kathie Moehlig of TransFamily Support Services (TFSS), San Diego will host this year's Gender Odyssey and serve as the on-the-ground team and co-producer. Kathie is also a PFLAG San Diego County Board member. As always, TFSS will be

She was recently elected as the president of the Eastlake Bonita Democratic Club, after having served as the public relations officer and secretary. Brenda recently returned as a delegate to the California State Democratic Convention. She's also a member of Mi Familia, an organization serving as a support group for LGBTQ families, allies, and communities. Brenda is a pansexual, unapologetic married mother of four on a mission to give a voice to those who are silenced and to challenge those who silence them.

Receiving the Mary Wagner Memorial Scholarship is Laura James. Laura is working on her second master's degree which she highlights in her essay. While she is supportive of the LGBTQ+ population, she is a strong advocate in supporting the transgender community. Besides being active at

Alliant International University, she is active in the LGBTQ+ community. Donors of part of the scholarship, Marilyn and Art Carpenter, were visiting from Alaska and were able to present the scholarship to Laura in person.

"I am currently a graduate student in the Couple and Family Therapy master's program at the California School of Professional Psychology at Alliant International University's San Diego campus. As a future therapist, the population

I want to work with is the LGBTQIA+ community, and I strive to bring elements of LGBTQIA+ perspectives and resources to each of my classes.

In addition to being a full-time student, I am the current president and a former secretary of PRIDE@Alliant, a student-led organization whose mission is to 'create a movement of social justice and advocacy toward inclusion and diversity for all [Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual] and Transgender/Gender Non-conforming/Non-binary students and allies of the Alliant University community and beyond.'

I have been involved with PRIDE@Alliant since I began my studies in August 2018. During this time, we have provided multiple training events for students, faculty, and members of the community. Training topics have included American Psychological Association guidelines for working with LGBT clients, HIV awareness, affirmative practices in therapy, bias awareness, vocabulary, sexual orientation, gender identity, creating safe spaces, and becoming an ally, as well as providing networking opportunities and discussion groups with LGBTQIA+ community panels. My team has also effected change and promoted inclusion by challenging the university to reassign all single-stall restrooms on campus as gender-neutral and to update signage, and we continue to look for ways to make our campus more inclusive.

I identify as cisgender and lesbian, and I am also the parent of a 10-year-old child who identifies as bisexual. When news that the Trump Administration was seeking to redefine gender, my daughter and I discussed the impact that this biased decision would have on people who identify as transgender/non-binary. Together, we decided that we must take action. We made posters, and I took my daughter to her first political protest – the Won't Be Erased March and Rally in San Diego. Raising children who not only understand equity and social justice issues but who are dedicated to promoting these ideals are among my highest priorities.

I retired from active-duty in July 2018 after serving more than 20 years in the Navy and am a disabled combat Veteran. The majority of my time in the military was spent serving in silence under Don't Ask, Don't Tell. I have witnessed and experienced the harm that a non-affirming or hostile milieu can cause, as well as challenges members of the LGBTQIA+ community face in locating affirming mental health providers. It is largely because of these experiences that I decided to pursue a career in mental health.

I believe I have demonstrated, throughout my life, my dedication to making the world a better place. Even when I was unable to live openly during my military service, I found ways to promote diversity and inclusion, serving as an equal opportunity advisor and as president of multicultural committees at multiple duty stations. When Don't Ask, Don't Tell was finally repealed, I immediately came out as lesbian; I knew it was important for younger LGBTQIA+ Sailors to have an ally and for those more senior to have someone to hold them

accountable. I also played an instrumental role in the policy repeal implementation, advising leaders and providing training to all paygrades.

Now that I am embarking on the next chapter of my life, I am no longer restrained by military policies. I can become more openly involved in social justice issues and will continue to advocate for oppressed and marginalized populations. As PRIDE@Alliant president, I will continue to lead my team in developing current, relevant, and affirming LGBTQIA+ training curricula and in holding monthly training workshops for current and future mental health professionals.

Once I complete my master's degree in couple and family therapy, I plan to pursue my doctorate in couple and family therapy, where I can better focus on trans-related areas of psychological research. In my future practice as an LGBTQ-affirming therapist, I plan to specialize in gender therapy and in issues impacting trans/non-binary clients and their families, helping clients address and navigate their gender journeys to become their most authentic selves."

STONEWALL 50: A LEGACY OF LIBERATION

This is a perfect them to kick off San Diego Pride's 45th Pride celebration, taking place July 12-14. This year marks the 50th anniversary of the Stonewall Riots, a moment in history where members of the LGBT community fought back against police brutality and the legal oppression and "won." It started with a series of violent confrontations that began in the early hours of June 28, 1969, between police, who were brutal in the treatment of the gay community, and gay rights activists at the Stonewall Inn, a gay bar in the Greenwich Village. The "event" lasted three days and is heralded as the beginning of the mainstream LGBT rights movement.

July 12 (Friday): Spirit of Stonewall Rally and Awards - they will be presented to individuals or groups who contribute significantly to the LGBT community through their leadership, activism, and fundraising effort. The location for the rally is the Hillcrest Pride Flag, 1500 University Avenue, Hillcrest, starting at 6:00 pm. The event is free..

July 13 (Saturday): At 8:00 am, Front Runners and Walkers will have their Pride 5K Run/Walk beginning at University Avenue at Centre Street. To register, go to: www.frwsd.org.

July 13 (Saturday): PLEASE NOTE THE TIME FOR THE PRIDE PARADE, AS THE START TIME HAS CHANGED FROM PREVIOUS YEARS: it at 10:00 am. It starts at University Avenue and Normal Street in Hillcrest. The route is 1.5 miles. If you have never marched in San Diego's parade, please join the PFLAG contingent as we walk shoulder to shoulder with TransFamily Support Services, Transparents Tucson, and Transforming Family. Besides all the excitement of the event, the crowd goes crazy when PFLAG passes by. There are upwards of 100,000 spectators. And speaking of walking 1.5 miles, if you cannot walk that distance and want to ride in the parade, please contact Mike Minnick immediately. Mike can be reached at 619-804-5512 or mminnick@pflag.com. Free event.

After the parade (until 10:00 pm) is the Pride Festival (also **Sunday, July 14** from 11:00 am-9:00 pm), which includes multiple stages of entertainment, more than 80 musicians, bands, comedy and dance performers, 300 participating vendor booths, an art exhibit, cultural presentations, and great food! There is also a Farmers Market, Beer Garden, and Youth Zone. Most important is our PFLAG booth, located on the main drag. The festival is located at Marston Point at 6th and Laurel in Balboa Park. Tickets are \$20 for one day and \$25 for the weekend (+\$1.75 service charge if purchased online). To purchase tickets: www.sdpride.org. Please note, there are no discounts for seniors or military. At the Festival, tickets are \$30.00 which is a weekend pass. High school aged youth and younger are free and passes are given out at the box office.

The main entertainment features Melissa Etheridge who will perform on the main stage Sunday at 7:00 pm. For a list of other entertainers, go to sdpride.org/festival-line-up/.

SOME COUNTRIES GET IT

American Christian extremist Steven Anderson, best known for his hateful diatribes and calls for violence against LGBTQ people, has been denied entry into 26 European countries. The Arizona pastor has already been banned from Jamaica, South Africa, the UK, and Canada; he was arrested and deported while in Botswana in 2016.

Anderson is a Holocaust denier who praised the Pulse Nightclub shooter. He claims the Bible says they were "death worthy."

In the past, Anderson has encouraged his congregants to kill all gay people, calling it a "cure for AIDS." He has also advocated for world governments to execute gay people, saying the Bible commands that certain people be put to death. He claims gay people not be put to death by him or other Christians, but feels "the government's job is to punish criminals and to execute those who committed capital crimes. And according to the Bible, homosexuality is a capital crime. And I didn't write the Bible." Sick man.
