ANOTHER AMAZING DOCUMENTARY FROM NETLFIX

Disclosure is an eye-opening look at transgender depictions in film and television, while stimulating our deepest anxieties about gender. Trans leaders share their reactions and resistance to some of Hollywood's most beloved moments. Although there are more than six trans people in the film, some names you may recognize are Laverne Cox, Lilly Wachowski, Yance Ford, Mj Rodriguez, Jamie Clayton, and Chaz Bono. They grapple with some films like Dog Day Afternoon, The Crying Game, and Boys Don't Cry and with shows like The L-Word and Pose. They trace a history that is at once dehumanizing, yet also evolving, complex, and sometimes humorous. What emerges is a fascinating story of dynamic interplay between trans representation on screen, society's beliefs, and the reality of trans lives. It is meant to provoke a startling revolution in how we see and understand trans individuals.

We will meet at Southwestern College, 900 Otay Lakes Road, Chula Vista and travel through the streets of Chula Vista.

Diversionary Theatre at Home presents *The Boy Who Walked on Air* from **July 6-19**. You can purchase tickets to stream the play at diversionary.org. Tickets range from \$15-35 for a household. There is a discount for students, educators, and those suffering financial hardship caused by the Covid-19 pandemic.

Synopsis: This musical reveals the clandestine yet persistent tradition in Afghanistan of Bacha Bazi, where wealthy men purchase boys from poor families, train them as dancers, and parade them at parties as their property. Paiman and Feda have spent their young lives confined within this tradition. But when they meet by chance and develop feelings for one another, they embark on a journey towards a new life in uncharted territory.







PRIDE LIVE: TOGETHER WE RISE

Pride week will go on as planned, virtually at least, despite the Pride Parade and Festival being canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic

San Diego Pride plans online events from **July 11-18** that will aim to digitally recreate the annual event's mission, advocacy, and spirit of celebration.

The community is invited to participate in the celebration. Members of the LGBTQ+ community are invited to send in videos of themselves describing what Pride means to them. The videos will be shown all day on Pride's social media channels on **July 18** (see below), the original date for this year's parade and the first day of the festival.

Fernando Zweifach López, Executive Director of San Diego Pride stated, "The reason why we celebrate and go out individually and as a group and are so joyful is because for the rest of the year, we're told we're a moral failure. We're told we're lesser than and we're discriminated against. These are acts of celebration and acts of protest against that narrative. Pride is to combat the concept of shame. We give people an opportunity to be together, tell their stories and live their authentic lives, even if it's only for an hour or one day of the year." He finds it heartbreaking that we can't do any of that in person this year.

López said the idea of integrating people's personal videos into this year's virtual events is a way of giving community members to express themselves. Cellphone-recorded videos of 15 to 30 seconds can be uploaded at sdpride.org/shareyourpride/. Members of the LGBTQ+ community are encouraged to share how Pride changed their lives and any special memories from past events.

Listed are the schedule of events. If times and links are not listed, they were not yet posted on sdpride.org. Closer to the events, please visit sdpride.org/events/

July 11: She Fest - for LGBTQ+ women and their allies. From 10:30 am-3:30 pm there will be live-streamed programming which will include workshops, interviews with leaders, education, and a pet fashion show (sounds like a must-see).

July 15: 7:00-8:00 pm - Pride will host its annual interfaith event via live-stream with the annual <u>lighting of St. Paul's Episcopal Cathedral</u> on Sixth Avenue with rainbow lights, along with a discussion on how faith can be a tool for social justice against anti-black and anti-LGBTQ+ violence and hate.

July 17: 6:00-7:00 pm - The online Spirit of Stonewall Rally will feature awards, speakers, and interviews with the award recipients (the list of awardees may be found on sdpride.org, Event.) This is a time of honoring the history of gay rights and addressing the challenges that lay ahead. The Community Grand Marshal: Essential Workers. What a wonderful idea!

July 18: Pièce de résistance - Ten hours of programming are starting in the morning with appearances and performances by the parade's usual contingents, mixed with the personal videos uploaded to the website. In the afternoon, the festival will be recreated with live entertainment by DJs and singers, celebrity appearances, tributes to the Black and Latino LGBTQ+ communities, and more. July 18: <u>Virtual Pride 5K Run + Walk from 8:00 am-5:00 pm.</u> Registration is required: www.bit.ly/5kpride.

Since all of the programming will be offered free online, López hopes viewers will be moved to donate to San Diego Pride, which has set a fundraising goal for the week of \$840,000. That money will go to year-round programming, grants, and the Tracie Jada O'Brien Transgender Student Scholarship. Over the years, Pride has given out more than \$3 million to LGBTQ+-serving organizations.



PROUD AS PUNCH

Past PFLAG SDC president and jack-of-all-trades, Bobbi Harwood was named Mama's Kitchen Volunteer of the Year for 2020. Bobbi started at Mama's Kitchen in 1998; that's 22 years ago! After years of delivering meals to homebound HIV/AIDS

clients and other needed tasks, Bobbi now works in the kitchen preparing meals for delivery. Besides HIV/AIDS clients, Mama's Kitchen now serves clients with cancer, diabetes, and other serious illnesses.

LIGHTBULB AT THE END OF THE TUNNEL

In 2011, Camp Lightbulb became one of the first nonprofit camps for LGBTQ+ youth (ages 14-18) in the nation. Founder Puck Markham envisioned the creation of a Rainbow Tribe: a common network of validated and confident LGBTQ+ youth who support and have fun with one another. Their virtual camps run **through August 29**, with various themes throughout the summer. Times are between 10:00 am-6:00 pm PT, weekdays. While their fee is \$100/day, they have a "Pay what you Can" policy. Visit www.camplightbulb.org for more details.


