STILL A GRAND MARSHAL

Our guest speaker is Joey Ramelli, who was subjected to

persistent and severe antigay harassment while he was a student at Poway High School. Ramelli endured repeated antigay slurs, was knocked to the ground, slammed into

lockers and even found notes threatening his life taped to his car in the school parking lot. He reported his harassment to the school principal, but these complaints were pushed aside. So he took the school to court with Megan Donovan, a lesbian who suffered similar harassment. In June 2005, a San Diego jury found that school officials failed to

take appropriate action to protect them from harm. The

school appealed this decision and with the assistance of Lambda Legal, Joey and Megan won the appeal and were awarded monetary settlements. This

is a landmark case in that it established legal precedent that schools have to protect LGBT students. They were both Grand Marshals of the Pride Parade in 2005. Joey will tell his personal story, as well as the story of his lawsuit.

After the presentation, we will have our cookie social and support groups.

REPEAL DOMA

In February, in a major policy reversal, the Obama administration said it will no longer defend the constitutionality of a federal law (DOMA/Defense of Marriage Act) banning recognition of same-sex marriage. DOMA was signed into law in 1996. Besides defining marriage as between one man and one woman, no state may be required to recognize same-sex marriage that was performed and considered legal in that state.

Attorney General Eric Holder said President Obama has concluded that the administration cannot defend the federal law that defines marriage as only between a man and a woman. He noted that the congressional debate during passage of the Defense of Marriage Act "contains numerous expressions reflecting moral disapproval of gays and lesbians and their intimate and family relationships - precisely the kind of stereotype-based thinking and animus

the (Constitution's) Equal Protection Clause is designed to guard against."

The Justice Department had defended the act in court until now.

White House spokesperson Jay Carney said Obama himself is still "grappling" with his personal view of gay marriage but has always personally opposed the Defense of Marriage Act as "unnecessary and unfair."

Regarding binational same-sex marriage, Section 3 of DOMA basically states that a U.S. citizen, even if legally married in the U.S. or a foreign country, cannot sponsor their partner (a citizen of another country) for citizenship in the U.S. (of course, opposite-sex couples can).

The annual breakfast brings together San Diegans who support equality and justice in celebration of the memory of the life and work of Harvey Milk. Sponsored by The San Diego LGBT Community Center and the City of San Diego Human Relations Commission, it is their hope that this event will not only honor the memory of this American hero, but also strengthen coalitions among the many diverse social justice groups working toward equality in San Diego.

DOOLEY AT THE DIVERSIONARY

On **May 14**, you can have fun, be entertained, and most important, be part of the solution to benefit the humanitarian work the local St. Paul's Foundation for International Reconciliation is doing to help the LGBT community in Uganda.

Dooley (Dr. Tom Dooley) was a man who delighted in his sexuality, paid consequences, and yet refused to be defeated, long before 'Don't Ask, Don't Tell'. Dooley did his residency at Camp Pendleton. He died young, but was cited by John F. Kennedy for his

humanitarian work in Southeastern Asia as an inspiration for the start of the Peace Corps.

AN ADVOCATE'S VOICE IS SILENCED

The death of Elizabeth Taylor meant a death of one of the strongest AIDS allies for the LGBT community. When she first began speaking out about HIV/AIDS in the early 1980s, there was still a great deal of mystery, fear and stigma surrounding the disease. She was the first big celebrity to use her fame to advocate for better public health policy, and to raise funds for HIV/AIDS treatment, services, and research. While she started local, appearing at the first major AIDS benefit for AIDS Project Los Angeles (APLA), in 1985 she became the founding international chairperson of the American Foundation for AIDS Research (amFAR). It was a time when thousands of people became devastatingly ill and died rapid and horrible deaths, and yet the silence from our government was deafening. In those dark times, Elizabeth Taylor used the light of her celebrity to draw mainstream media attention to the government's failure to respond to the AIDS crisis. She boldly stood with the LGBT community to urge public support for better treatment of people living with HIV/AIDS. In those days, before e-mail, texting, Facebook and Twitter, her voice had a powerful ripple effect that helped make the world more aware of this growing health crisis.

Ms. Taylor took on the fight for a cure with a determined and focused passion. She traveled around the world – she spoke at conferences, visited with people with AIDS in hospital wards, testified before Congress to ensure support for the Ryan White CARE Act and addressed the General Assembly at the United Nations on World AIDS Day.

In addition to supporting the work of numerous HIV/AIDS organizations, in 1991 she established the Elizabeth Taylor AIDS Foundation, with a focus on direct services for people living with HIV/AIDS throughout the world. So much of this was part of her, that her family requested that any memorial donations benefit that fund.

In 1993, she was awarded a special humanitarian Oscar for her HIV/AIDS advocacy. As she received that award 18 years ago, she spoke words that are just as resonant today as they were then: "I call upon you to draw from the depths of your being -- to prove that we are a human race, to prove that our love outweighs our need to hate, that our compassion is more compelling than our need to blame."

MIGHT MAKES RIGHT

Pressure from the LGBT community on Apple to remove the app from iTunes, that was introduced by Exodus International, worked. The app, which claimed to help people deal with unwanted same-sex attractions, followed the teachings of Exodus International, which suggests that there is a "cure" to being gay (we also heard how Exodus International works from ex-gay founder Michael Bussee, a critic of Exodus International, when he spoke at our February general meeting). We know such efforts have been condemned by every respected medical and psychological group in this country as explicitly dangerous and harmful to both physical and mental health. By removing this app, Apple has reinforced its commitment to "harm none."

PFLAG National commended Apple for following it's guidelines to remove "Any app that is defamatory, offensive, meanspirited, or likely to place the targeted individual or group in harm's way will be rejected." The American Psychological Association. American Medical Association. American Psvchiatric Association, and American Counseling Association have all rejected "ex-gay" therapy, saying that it can result in serious harm to the mental health of its victims. The mission of Exodus International is truly harmful to LGBT people.

OUT AT THE PARK

The fifth annual Out at the Park is Saturday, May 7, at 5:35 pm at Petco Park (vs Arizona Diamondbacks). Every year, San Diego Pride collaborates with the San Diego Padres to give the LGBT community discount tickets to this event. This year, however, will feature a pre-game tailgate party with hot dogs, hamburgers, beer, cocktails and soft drinks. The tailgate party will be held from 3:30 to 5 pm at Imperial Avenue and 14th Street. Tickets to the game are \$15 and tailgate admission is \$5, which includes food and beverages.

"The outing at Petco Park has become one of San Diego Pride's most popular events leading up to our annual summer celebration in July," said Frank Scarpaci, interim executive director for San Diego Pride. "We've consolidated the seating this year as a way of bringing LGBT attendees and their supporters together in a show of team spirit and solidarity."


